Susan Blankenship

A graduate of the University of Kansas, Artist Susan Blankenship has been an art educator for 36 years currently continuing her long tenure at Paola High School. Susan works in a variety of two-dimensional media: oil, acrylic, colored pencil, pen and ink mixed on altered paper, pastel, and calligraphy. While specializing in portraiture, Susan notes: "Anything I find visually appealing may end up on my canvas." Her single favorite work is "Barrel Cactus" and reflects her interest in the natural world. The portraits in this exhibit feature famed entertainers using an interesting combination of thick modeling paste and transparent acrylic to capture the well recognized features of the star laced with special calligraphy denoting a unique piece of the star's career.

Title: "Heirloom Beauty"

Displayed in the opening exhibit at Reflections MCMC, "Heirloom Beauty" creates the illusion of a colorful bowl of heirloom tomatoes which Susan says was inspired by a neighboring gardener's successful tomato patch.























Peter Procter


Title: "Benjamin"





Born and raised in Smith Center, Kansas, Brad Reinking began his art education with private lessons from the 4th grade high school. He received his BA from Bethany College in art education and continues to serve public education as the head of the Spring Hill High School art department. Brad currently lives in Paola, KS. In addition to painting and ceramics, Brad is a graphic/digital artist and applies technology to his traditional artworks to digitally enhance the color pallet. He regularly exhibits in corporate offices through the Kansas City area. His appreciation of sports champions is a frequent theme in his fine art. His work was recently featured at The Art Institute located off 1-35 at 87th Street and is collected by several major Kansas City Corporation.

Title: "Then & Now"

Inspired to paint this representation of Buck O'Neil's life after attending the Negro League Museum in downtown Kansas City, Mr. Reinking took a group of art students to the museum assigning students to create a work of art that reflected how the field trip inspired them. Thinking he should lead by example, he created "Then & Now" which portrays the seriousness of Buck's career in the 1940's compared to flamboyant athlete Buck became later. Blending past to present using digital technology, Brad fades the black and white to red white and blue depicting a true champion over bias and prejudice and a true American sports icon – Buck O'Neil

Wanting the moment to be extraordinarily colorful, Brad used a computer and his graphic design skills to create this color palette with richer reds and strong yellows. Notice the loose brush strokes. Brad notes that artists must be mindful of copyright laws in conjunction with logos and carefully avoids trying to create an aunauthorized "photograph."


Title: "Mr. Adversity: Joe Montana"





Wendy Ping


